- Launched in 2021
- The ultimate goals of this global strategy are:
  - improve food security and nutrition
  - reduce poverty
  - enhance safe trade in livestock and animal products
- By reducing repeated incursions and further spread of infectious disease epidemics


LSD Lumpy Skin Disease





  - collaboration & cooperation








#### Regional Workshop for Avian Disease Prevention and Control in AP


#### **Sub-Regional TADs Prevention and Control Strategies**

Three Sub-Regional Strategies/Roadmap for South-East Asia developed and endorsed by ASEAN Governing Bodies





















**Aims** 

- improve regional coordination and cooperation for more effective control and mitigation of the impacts of TADs
- \*adopt global strategies such as GF-TADs Strategy and other specific TADs of global concern (ASF, FMD, PPR etc) to sub-regional context and leveraging on the existing ASEAN mechanism.
- promote ownership of Regional Economic Communities (ASEAN) and its Member States by involving them right from the strategy development stage

#### **TADs Coordination Meeting for SAARC**


Paro, Bhutan, 8-12 May 2023








## Official Disease Status

Since 1998, the World Organisation for Animal Health has the mandate from the WTO to officially recognise disease-free areas of countries for trade purposes. The procedure for the official recognition of animal health status by WOAH is voluntary and applies currently to six diseases

In May 1994, the World Assembly of Delegates of the World Organisation for Animal Health (WOAH, founded as OIE) requested the Foot and Mouth Disease and Other Epizootics Commission (re-named later as Scientific Commission for Animal Diseases) to develop a procedure for the official recognition by the WOAH of the <u>foot</u> and mouth disease (FMD) free status of Members.






