# Report on progress: Basel Convention Partnership Programme

## Note by the Secretariat

#### I. Introduction

1. At its eighth meeting, the Conference of the Parties to the Basel Convention adopted, in its decision VIII/5, a workplan of the Basel Convention Partnership Programme for the biennium 2007–2008. In the same decision, it also requested the Secretariat to keep the Open-ended Working Group and the Conference of the Parties informed on progress on the implementation of the workplan.

# II. Implementation

#### A. Progress reports

2. The annex to the present note contains a progress report in table format on partnership activities undertaken since the eighth meeting of the Conference of the Parties. A progress report on activities undertaken by the Mobile Phone Partnership Programme is provided separately in document UNEP/CHW/OEWG/6/19, and partnerships addressing the environmentally sound management of used and end-of-life computing equipment and e-waste are discussed in document UNEP/CHW/OEWG/6/20.

## B. Partnerships under the Basel Convention

3. The Partnership Programme was launched at the sixth meeting of the Conference of Parties and was integrated as a priority cluster activity in the Strategic Plan for the Implementation of the Basel Convention. Several decisions by the Conference of the Parties, decisions VI/31, VI/32, VII/3, VII/4, VIII/2 and VIII/5, laid the foundations for the Partnership Programme. As the Partnership Programme has evolved, it is timely to reiterate the basis of the Programme and how the partnerships function in

relation to the Convention in assisting Parties in better implementing the Convention and its Strategic Plan to 2010. Experience to date shows that the following are the underlying concepts and purposes of the partnerships established under the Basel Convention Partnership Programme.

- (a) **Partnerships.** Under the Basel Convention, partnerships are viewed as a creative mechanism for Parties and stakeholders to work together in a voluntary forum to address new and emerging waste streams which raise particularly complex issues. A partnership can be requested by the Parties to address particular needs or carry out specific activities. Within the cooperative nature and structure of a Partnership, issues can be addressed by a range of experts committed to achieving commonly agreed and technically viable solutions while at the same time ensuring that the Basel Convention's goals and objectives are respected.
- (b) **Purpose of partnerships.** A public-private partnership is a forum in which activities can be carried out with all experts working together towards common solutions. It is a body designed to focus on new or innovative ways to address changes and new trends. Such new trends could be, for example, the increasing volume of international trade and the decentralization of markets for goods and wastes subject to Basel controls, such as used or end-of-life products. A partnership can develop guidance documents, make recommendations and undertake technical work as requested by the Convention Parties.
- Partnerships are a special type of voluntary body, established within the context of the Convention, and are comprised of government officials from Parties and Signatories, representatives of the private sector, civil society, academia and other international organizations and bodies which can contribute their technical expertise to addressing the subject matter of a particular partnership. Partnerships depend on voluntary contributions or membership fees for their costs of administration and for projects or activities. Each partnership has terms of reference reflecting its own governance structure, as determined appropriate by the founding partners, and consistent with the mandate granted by the Conference of the Parties. Members of a partnership sign a declaration of commitment and each partnership operates under the guidance of the Open-ended Working Group.

## III. Proposed action

4. The Open-ended Working Group may wish to consider adopting a decision along the following lines:

"The Open-ended Working Group,

Welcoming the progress made under the Partnership Programme and its support for environmentally sound management, including through the building of sustainable partnerships between Parties and other stakeholders at the global, regional and local levels,

Also welcoming the extrabudgetary funding provided by Germany, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland to support the Basel Convention partnerships and the resource mobilization programme;

- 1. *Urges* Parties and stakeholders to participate in the partnerships and join new initiatives in addition to providing financial and in-kind support to the Basel Convention Partnership Programme and to funding the post of Senior Programme Officer for Partnerships and Resource Mobilization as a means to support and facilitate implementation of the Partnership Programme;
- 2. Requests the Secretariat to continue implementing the work plan for 2007–2008 in cooperation with all relevant stakeholders and to submit a progress report for consideration by the Conference of the Parties at its ninth meeting;
- 3. Also requests the Secretariat to prepare a draft work plan for the next budget cycle for consideration of the Conference of the Parties at its ninth meeting, as provided in decision VIII/5, paragraph 3."
