

## **Muggings: Case study**

 "Bangkok, 6 June 1999warning issued against taking unlicensed taxis from Bangkok's international airport.



## Muggings: Case study

- This was after allegations that Thai authorities concealed an investigation into the murder of at least six foreigners during the previous 10 months.
- All were apparently lured into unlicensed taxis on arrival in Bangkok, usually at Terminal 2, taken to isolated areas on the outskirts of the city, robbed and murdered."

Types of problems are claimed on travel insurance	
Loss/theft/muggings	25%
Medical	
■ Respiratory	20%
<ul><li>Musculoskeletal</li></ul>	17%
<ul><li>Gastrointestinal</li></ul>	14%
■ Ear, nose & throat	12%
■ Dental problems	7%
<ul><li>Cardiovascular</li></ul>	6%
<ul><li>Dermatological</li></ul>	5% (Leggat et al., 2002)



# Morbidity: Acts of assault, muggings & theft

- "Westerners" travelling in developing countries are considered "rich"
- Even tattered "Nike's can be a prize!"
- Travellers should carry just what they need and given advice on personal safety and security











Are travellers concerned about their safety?

Yes, they are!

Major Amex study in 1999

• More than 75% of travellers concerned about safety when travelling overseas





Are travel health advisers concerned about travellers safety?

#### Australian & New Zealand GPs

- About 50% of GPs in Australia would normally advise travellers about personal safety abroad (Seelan & Leggat 2002)
- About 50% of GPs in New Zealand would normally advise travellers about personal safety abroad (Leggat et al., 1998)

## **Travel clinics worldwide**


 About 70% of travel clinics worldwide would regularly advise travellers about personal safety abroad (Hill et al., 1996)

Hopefully most of your travellers are going to typical tourist destinations in this type of guide...

Africa





Travel advisories have assumed great importance

Travel advisories should be included in the pretravel health consultation



Destination specific information needed...

Need to know the types of safety and security concerns at each destination...

Ability to register with local embassy can also be useful...





Travel insurance is probably the most important safety net for travellers today

Other measures might include first aid training, travellers' medical kit, making copies of important documents/keeping them with someone etc...

What are the chances of something going wrong?



Major study with Australian travel insurer

Approx 20,000 policies issued each year (incl. Exec. Gold)

- About 1600 claims (8%)
- 400 claims for emergency assistance (2%)
- 80 ER or clinic referrals (0.4%)
- 46 Hospital admissions (0.2%) \*Leggat et al (2005
- 10 Aeromedical evacuations (0.05%)





### Travel insurance

- Only 60% of travellers routinely take out travel insurance
- One third indicated that they never took out travel insurance

Leggat et al., J Travel Med 2002

■ About 60% of GPs in NZ would routinely advise travellers about travel insurance Leggat et al., J Travel Med 1998 So to summarise from Smartraveller.gov.au

"If you don't have travel insurance, you can't afford to travel"

## Take home points

- Accidents and muggings resulting in death and injury abroad are common
- abroad are common

  Travellers are concerned about personal safety and they need to have some appreciation of common sense personal safety and security measures

  Personal safety, bird flu and terrorism are on the radar screen and travel advisories are important
- Travel insurance is an important safety net
