



background

- 38.6% of males smoked, including 18.1% of males between the ages of 18-20 smoke, jumping to 38.0% of males in the ages of 21-25.
- These are also the age in which males in Taiwan serve in the military.
- With this in mind, the Department of Health and the Ministry of National Defense began promoting the military tobacco and betel nut control program in 2003.



Smoke-free military

- Why is tobacco control in the military important?
 - The typical soldier is male, 21 to 25 years old a profitable demographic for big tobacco
- 2003 Tobacco Control in the Military project
 - To ensure enforcement of tobacco control policies
 - To strengthen tobacco control education in the military
 - To reduce the smoking rate among military personnel

Monitoring and research

- In 2004, a study population, consisting of military volunteers and draftees, was surveyed by questionnaire to understand their smoking behavior.
- In 2005, enlisted personnel and officers of the military were studied using a proportional sampling method.
- A sampling of 43 units from each military branch was taken and all officers and enlisted personnel were studied.

Policy and environment

- Prohibited all smoking indoors
- Banned smoking outdoors except in smoking areas
- Gradual reduction in the designated smoking areas
- Military units currently have 1,552 designated smoking areas, down 357 from the previous year.

Smoking-cessation and services

- In 2008, 558 physicians were trained to assist smokers quit smoking
- 6,026 smokers took advantage of outpatient services to quit smoking.
- Three-month follow-up study showed that the success rate of smoking cessation was 7.49%.
