

Effective Collections at conference

For the past five years the MA has supported museums collections through the Effective Collections programme, the Esmée Fairbairn Collections Fund and the Monument Fellowships.

Effective Collections ended in 2012, having given grants to over 40 projects, ranging from the Scapa Flow collection in Orkney to costume in Ceredigion, marine biology in Plymouth and archaeology in Peterborough.

With two application deadlines per year, the Esmée Fairbairn Collections Fund awards grants between £20,000-£100,000 to museums with projects that improve understanding, appreciation and use of collections.

Autumn 2012 is also the deadline for a new round of Monument Fellowships, a series of bursaries for retired/retiring individuals to return to a museum to share their knowledge.






Floor plan


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
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
