### 一、摘要

此次受本校朱宗慶校長指派代表學校參與由英國文化協會(British Council)在杜拜舉辦的國際教育論壇(Going Global 2013),是本校首次參與類似盛會。為時兩天的會議,根據大會的統計,共有來自83個國家,1,300多人與會。會議舉辦地點在杜拜的世貿中心,場地設施充足完善,且善用科技工具提供視聽與資訊搜尋交流之服務,主辦單位建議住宿的旅館又在會場隔壁,可見整個規劃團隊前置作業之用心,令人印象深刻。而身為台灣代表成員之一,除了能夠在英國文化協會在台代表 Alison Devine 安排帶領下,與教育部國際及兩岸教育司林文通司長、淡江大學張家宜校長,以及幾位來自台師大、中興、輔仁、北醫等學校負責國際事務的教師一起與會,備感榮耀之外,也藉由參與及聆聽不同場次的專題討論,獲得不少新知與啓發。

### 二、目的

英國文化協會辦理之「國際教育論壇(Going Global 2013)」邀請全球來自教育、商業以及政府領域之決策者與執行者參與盛會,經由多元的議題探討,一同思考教育的願景以及落實教育方針。研討會主題爲「全球教育:二十一世紀知識經濟新時代(Global Education: knowledge-based economies for 21st century nations)」。

### 三、過程

此次參加英國文化協會在杜拜世貿中心舉辦之 Going Global 2013,針對 21 世紀知識經濟高等教育發展主題所舉辦之論壇,共有來自 83 個國家,約 1,300 多人參與。整個過程可分為兩階段說明如下:

### (一) 準備階段

### 2. 行政業務處理

由本校國際交流中心負責後續行政處理業務,包括與英國文化協會聯繫、早鳥報名、訂機票、訂旅館、辦理簽證等事官。

#### 3. 行前說明會

爲了參與此次盛會,台灣代表團部分成員於出發前,已經在教育部國際及兩岸教育司林文通司長邀請下,與英國文化協會在台辦事處處長Alison Devine 及工作同仁先行碰面、聚餐,並由英方代表爲大家做簡報,以便進一步了解杜拜當地之地理環境、政經狀況及風土人情,也包括穿著該注意事項、忌用左手與人握手、節制飲酒、勿帶豬肉相關食品等事宜。由於Alison本人之前曾派駐在杜拜四年,故在餐敘之間,台灣參與成員也隨時提問,以期行前可以做好萬全的準備。現場簡報資料內容請見附件一。

### (二)參與階段

3月3日下午搭乘國泰航空班機經香港轉機飛往杜拜,3月8日上午 回台,以下根據在杜拜停留期間之行程表,分別說明如下:

1. 學術文化參訪日-- 3月4日

早上參訪杜拜的 Knowledge Village (知識村)和 International Academic City (國際學術市),以便進一步了解杜拜所規劃的自由區如何吸引世界上不同的大學進駐招生,以及目前各校進展情形。

下午參觀 Burj Khalifa (世界最高的哈里發塔,俗稱杜拜塔), 到 154 層樓高的觀景台,一覽市區全景。

晚上參加此次論壇的歡迎晚宴,就在哈里發塔下 Armani Hotel 內舉行,已事先註冊登記,當日取得名牌進入。在英國文化協會 三位代表簡單致詞後,晚宴隨即展開。侍者穿梭其間提供食物及 飲料,大家自由取用並交流、交談。由於地緣關係,晚宴期間亦 正好有機會欣賞每逢整點配合音樂演出的水舞秀。

### 2. 會議論壇日--3月5日及3月6日

論壇第一天早晨,所有與會者報到領取相關資料及布製提袋後,可先入大會場食用餐飲、與熟識者寒暄打招呼,並自備或現場租借科技產品,內有 SpotMe 之應用軟體,以利之後會議各場次的選擇及參與。

接著,所有參與者聚集至最大的會議廳,等待開幕,同時觀看台上正播放著不斷顯現各國國旗的影像。雖然因技術問題致使開幕式稍微延後開始,並做了些調整,但很欣奮因此能看到青天白日滿地紅國旗出現在影片中兩次,趕快拍照存證留念。

之後,幾位講者主要論及二十一世紀全球高等教育所面臨的挑戰之專題討論先進行,揭開序幕後,開幕式在螢幕上出現 Going Global 2013字樣下,由司儀宣布正式開始,特別敦請阿拉伯聯合酋長國的教育部長親臨會場致歡迎詞。其以英文說明杜拜與英國文化協會的密切合作關係,支持此次會議的重要意義,並預祝會議進行順利成功。

開幕式後,各場次同時於世貿中心不同樓層之 Shelk Rashid Hall、Dubai Room 和 Abu Dhabi Room 內不同場地開始進行,同時段最多有六個不同主題場次可選擇參與。(詳細的會議議程與各場次討論主題,請見附件二。)

3月5日晚上英國文化協會在台辦事處,特別和在韓國與日本辦

事處同仁合作,讓此次參與盛會的台灣、韓國及日本的大學代表 有機會相聚一堂,大家相談甚歡,尤其晚餐地點選在設有室內滑 雪場的大購物中心內,真是讓大家開了眼界,也不得不讚嘆杜拜 的奢華!

3月6日論壇第二天,各場次仍舊進行著,也有「世界咖啡桌」討論形式。

閉幕式特別找了一位父親是韓國人,母親是越南人,出生在約旦,成長於沙烏地阿拉伯,說得一口流利阿拉伯文和英文的亞裔人士,表演脫口秀,凸顯 Going Global 之主題,以及多元文化、跨文化相互尊重與理解的重要,此亦呼應本人前一天被要求錄製一段影片,以一個字來表達對此次參與盛會的想法時所說的"Multicultural"。

閉幕最後在英國文化協會代表 Dr. Jo Beall 針對此次會議的關注 焦點做結論,並致感謝詞,然後播放邁阿密歡迎大家明年蒞臨與 會的影片,而就在相約 2014 年邁阿密見的聲音中結束。

當日晚餐由我國駐杜拜代表處處長及幾位同仁一起設宴歡迎我們, 在他鄉遇到同胞分外親切,特別是得知代表處同仁多爲政治大學 拉伯語文學系畢業,也就是我的學長或學弟,非常有話聊,也爲 日後有機會再造訪時找到可連絡協助的朋友。

### 3. 杜拜一日遊--3 月 7 日

趁著下午離開杜拜前,大家自費請英國文化協會在台辦事處處長幫我們安排兩輛車,到杜拜舊城一遊,包括黃金市場、香料市場、坐小船遊河、參觀博物館、在皇宮前拍照,以及快速到從深海中打造的棕梠人工島逛一下,並有機會看到除了名聞遐邇的七星級帆船旅館外,另一座非常高級華麗的旅館一Palm Atlantis Hotel之外觀。

### 四、心得

本次參與論壇,對主、協辦單位、會場選擇與佈置、會議形式與討論主題等 有一些心得感想,將從幾個面向與角度分享如下:

### (一)會議地點選擇佳

1. 做為七個阿拉伯聯合酋長國之一的杜拜,因發現了黑金石油,故可運用豐富的財富從沙漠造城、從深海造島,儘管前兩年經濟危機影響不小,但仍然吸引大批觀光客前往一窺杜拜由人工造就的世界奇蹟。

此外,藉由在自由區(Free Zone)開放國際校院進駐招生辦學,對於在全球化趨勢下高等教育的發展,提供了國際化策略的典範。因此,選擇在杜拜舉辦有關 21 世紀高等教育相關論壇,是相當不錯亦有意義的決定,就連歡迎晚宴地點的選擇、布置與進行方式,都令人留下深刻的印象。

2. 會議在杜拜的世貿中心舉辦,主辦單位所建議的兩家住宿旅館 Novotel 及 Ibis 剛好在會場的兩端,從旅館至會場,非常便利, 且兩家旅館皆提供 Bus 服務,可到一些旅遊景點參觀購物。

Metro世貿中心站也在附近,且可直達國際機場,亦有利於參與者自行往返目的地。特別值得一提的是,有著五節車廂的 Metro 還分等級,Gold Class 價錢最貴,也有專門提供給女性同胞的車廂。

3. 世貿中心場地廳館空間足夠,與會人數即使超過千人,也能根據 自己有興趣的主題選擇參與,分散容納到不同空間。且包括中餐 及點心時間皆在會場進行,即使座位不多,常須站著用餐,但仍 進行的非常順暢,有秩序。

### (二)善用科技軟體

除了世貿中心本就具備的影音專業配備可讓參與者清晰地看到與聽到所有發言之外,會場設施先進完善,現場提供 SpotMe 應用軟體手機租借,可以事先知道會議各場次之進行,並可和相遇約談者透過應用軟體的設計,互換名片、資料,繼續維持日後之交流,顯見科技發達對人類的影響無遠弗屆,也驗證了會議中有人提醒注意科技

發展快於教育的現象,所有教育工作者的確需要對於未來教育環境 充滿想像力。

### (三)動用許多人力

每一個現場都有專門人員服務,科技支援諮詢人員、接待、廚師、 服務生、志工、專業攝錄影人員等等,相關文化教育機構的推廣行 銷人員亦常在會場內穿梭、主動出擊,提供資訊服務。可見前置培 訓作業一定花了不少時間與心力,所有專業人員也都必須發揮專業 精神與態度,才能創造舒適、友善並利於交流的環境。

### (四)會議形式多元豐富

會議有不同類型,包括 Panel 及 World Café等,兩者皆有主持人負責介紹與談人及引導討論議題,對於不同的聲音意見都能予以尊重, 且就我所參加的場次而言,不論是主持人或與談人在時間上都掌控 得宜,不愧是來自教育文化背景的學者專家代表。

同時,會場大廳有幾所大學和文化學術機構設有攤棚,以便和有興趣及有需求者進一步交流。參與人員進進出出也能隨時把握時間與機會彼此會談、溝通。另有海報發表形式,讓有興趣者駐足閱覽。

整體而言,可謂是以會議論壇爲主,但亦兼有小型教育展的功能。

#### (五)會議內容著重跨國分享

有許多主題作爲會議討論內容,主要針對高教面對的挑戰而提出,包括高教品質、國際化、多元化、高教世界排名、經費來源、科技衝擊、跨國合作(含研究)、跨國教育、高教如何培育國際移動人才,如何設定標準,符合業界所需,以及如何不受政府約制,展現獨立自主等等,都是非常重要的討論議題。

明顯可見的,除了英國不同學術機構一定有代表參與討論外,所邀 請與談講者,也會顧及地主國及其他來自不同文化背景者。且特別 著重在實際案例分享,亦即多以自身經驗或研究所得和大家分享, 而當台下觀眾提問時,也會談及自身經驗與看法。雖然可能因此較 不夠深入,但是對於增加對他國、他校的了解及開拓視野,仍是有 助益的。

### (六)英國文化協會已成功搭起世界交流平台

此次參與會議讓我更深刻體會到「文化才能使一個國家變得偉大」。 英國文化協會每年辦理 Going Global,好像讓人看到歷史上大英國 協的氣魄,且因爲是以文化教育、人才培育爲主軸,更容易超越政 治的藩籬與局限,搭建世界溝通的橋梁,爲人類的文明與繁衍做出 貢獻。換言之,英國文化協會的的角色功能已經是世界級的,其所 推動的重點方向及擴展的腳步策略,值得借鏡。

### 五、建議

以下針對參與 Going Global 2013 所帶來的啓示,從對本校和對台灣兩方面提出個人淺見供參:

### (一)對北藝大

### 1. 設定自我評鑑的準則

我參加了一場圓桌座談,主題 Do international standards make sense?因其他成員皆來自知識系統清晰完善的學術背景,例如醫學、理工、法律類科,與業界聯結強,所以很容易談到國際標準及大學如何設定標準,自我要求與提昇。

我提出藝術是否或該否有國際標準之質疑就教於其他人,他們咸 認為因藝術牽涉文化、美學,是非常不同的,很難以國際標準規 範,故未見列入世界高教排名機制。但也覺得每所藝術大學,就 學生技藝學習層面,或是課程架構層面,仍應訂定自己的準則。 例如:以古典音樂科系爲例,因在西方發展歷史悠久,應該還是 可以有世界標準的。此對本校尋求自評、外部評鑑及繼續追求卓 越,可提供一些思考。

就我看來,藝術領域不同於其他領域是被理解的,但我們仍需要 建構自己的準則,並要有足夠的能力與其他領域對話,才能不斷 提升「學」「術」層次。

### 2. 強化國際人才的培育

在全球化激烈競爭的環境下,許多國家鼓勵學生具有國際學習經驗,包括涉獵不同語言的學習,或是鼓勵教師跨國合作研究,這

些作法應該是標榜國際化的本校在未來必須更積極努力推動之方 向。尤其有位講者提及新世代必須具有全球移動的能力,也是我 們常說的帶得走的能力,包括文化適應能力、語言溝通能力、獨 立思考能力、時間管理能力或是想像創造能力等等,都值得作爲 我們培育人才的參考。

此外,我們對於一些尚未接觸的文化國度,也應多方了解,建立關係,以爭取更多國際人才到本校就讀、研修,或是講學、研究。

此次曾試圖接觸卡達大學,可惜該校以理工、商學爲主,沒有藝術相關科系。但因碰巧與一位來自黎巴嫩教授設計的教師交談,發現她任教的學校有建築設計科系。未來,本校國交中心及各系所可更主動參與國際盛會,尋求值得合作交流的夥伴學校與學術機構。

### 3. 面對科技新時代的來臨

知識內容的學習在 21 世紀因科技發達已無所不在,並可輕易取得, 且年輕世代對科技工具的使用已是如此普遍,教師亦必須熟悉與 運用科技輔助工具及教學互動平台。無疑地,世界一流校院在行 政管理以及課程教學方面的電子 e 化、網絡視 訊、數位學習平台、 線上教學或虛擬實境教學等等,已是時代的趨勢,更是未來教育 的必然。即便我們是強調技藝、智慧傳承的藝術大學也無法置身 這種早已超越時空限制,且大家都積極向外聯通、爭取與分享資 源的網絡世界。

因此,如何善用科技媒介,在面對科技發展快過教育的現象時, 又仍能保有人文教育核心精神,培育出真正的世界公民,應是北 藝大行政與教師團隊必需審慎以對的課題。建議本校同仁要有危 機意識,並對時代環境的變化,特別是對科技的進步保持警覺, 勇於學習、勇於任事,大膽接受各種挑戰,讓科技爲我們服務, 不斷提高行政與教學效能,與世界一流校院同步、接軌。

### (二)對台灣

#### 1. 展現自信,才能昂首闊步

杜拜設有教育自由區,有來自不同國家的大學在區域內設校招生, 競爭激烈。從聆聽有關跨國教育(Transnational Education)主題 的討論場次中,發現亦有其他國家如馬來西亞有此規畫設計。台灣不夠開放透明,高教校院太多,品質及經費差異大,教育部對高等教育的約制也太多,無法形塑良善的競爭環境,對高教影響甚鉅,也因而造成聯合報社論所提及台灣人才的困境:用不上、留不住和進不來,對台灣整體競爭力都造成威脅。

而從台灣人才培育的角度來看,多年來,台灣學生到國外真正有 心求學的積極度也不夠,留學人數明顯下滑,若因教育環境缺乏 國際視野,就很難培育具有國際競爭力的人才。特別是此次會議 發現發展中的國家如中東和亞洲許多國家都已急起直追,台灣真 的需要從整個高教發展方向、政策、機制、策略等各面向作全盤 檢討。

期待我們政府要更有自信,打開格局,勇敢面對競爭與挑戰。尤 其是教育部應以更開放、更自由市場機制的方式來看待今日的全 球化教育趨勢;也能多透過和不同國家負責教育的相關機構部門 多交流,以利更精準地掌握時代的脈動和人才的流動,有效解決 教育、人才培育方面的重重問題。

### 2. 迎向國際, 要有規劃配套

杜拜運用龐大的資金創造特色賣點,形塑國際友善環境,吸引國際觀光客、學生和工作人口,也爲自己的經濟、教育的發展開拓了新的契機與可能性。雖然體制不同,但杜拜領導者的眼光、行動力、爲國家人民找到未來出路之用心,以及如何改造杜拜邁向國際化的進程,仍有值得我們學習之處。

相較於杜拜的「人工」,台灣的文化底蘊及特色絕不遜色,但似乎欠缺中心思想和整體規劃。且由於是較民粹式的民主,缺乏法治、紀律和自省,以及對專業的尊重與理性對話的空間,致使政府施政目標方向不夠明確,無一貫性;實施手段也常瞻前顧後、不夠果斷,嚴重影響運作績效,更奢論改革成果。同時,我們的整體環境,包括視聽媒體在國際化、多元文化、科技化與人文關懷等各面向仍有待努力、加強,而如何在全球化與在地化之間尋求平衡,更考驗著我們的智慧、眼界與實踐力。

就以吸引觀光客爲例,杜拜塔已超過臺北的 101 成爲全球最高建築物,登塔一遊對觀光客極具吸引力,非常願意排隊等候、花錢

消費。而台灣還有好多名勝古蹟值得向世人推薦,只是我們的好山好水好人情,若缺乏適當的管道、媒介,以及友善、便利又吸睛的環境,將無法有效地傳遞給世界各地的朋友,並吸引他們的蒞臨。於此關鍵時刻,我們真的應該好好思考如何發揮傳統文化的優質面,並善用現代科技資源,有目標、有策略並非常創意地來建構國際化環境與條件,推展文化觀光產業,使台灣一如杜拜般成爲讓世人嚮往、夢想一遊的世界地標。同時,藉由更國際化的交流環境來增進對不同國家文化的認識與包容,開拓國人視野,以及刺激、創造更好的經貿利益和附加價值之機會。

### 3. 宣揚國威,需要長期深耕

英國文化協會於 1934 年創立,明年將進入第八十個年頭。而因台灣政治外交的特殊地位,英國文化協會曾與我國外交部協議,以「英國文化協會」之名稱在台推廣協會各項服務,包括英語教學、英國留學資訊的提供、推廣英國教育、文化、藝術方面的成就等等,並致力於建立兩國之間的互惠合作關係。

儘管我們國際空間經常受到打壓,但台灣過去幾年已經創造全球 一百多個國家給予免簽的紀錄,這不僅是外交部門的輝煌成就, 更彰顯國家文明及人民素質受到世人的尊重與肯定。建議在國際 強烈競爭環境下,我們是否思考經由政府各部門和民間機構的通 力合作,讓類似英國文化協會的角色,例如在各地設置的台灣書 院,或是其他可能的文教機構,發揮文化外交的功能,成爲我國 與世界的鍊結樞紐,將台灣推出去,把世界帶進來。

### 六、結語

#### 最後,我想再次強調:

教育是否為一Business,或許見仁見智,但其絕對是國家實力展現的後盾,尤其是軟實力之根基。高等教育更是國家培育尖端人才的重鎮,誠如與會一位講者所言,大學要培養的是"Beautiful Mind"。本校作為國家一流的藝術大學,不論是從「軟實力」或是"Beautiful Mind"的角度觀之,我們都肩負著極其重要的義務與使命,必須勇往直前,建立自己的特色,培育國內藝術菁英份子,同時吸引更多國際優秀學子,讓國立臺北藝術大學在21世紀國際高等教育中占有一席之地。
