## Mutual Recognition

- MR means that the security requirements/standards of the industry partnership program, as well as its verification procedures, are the same or compatible with those of the potential MR partner
- **MR is a long term goal**
  - Customs, AEO Programs & Trade Community must realize the time, effort and resources that goes into achieving MR.

## **MRA: Benefits (Trade)**

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- Companies will go through fewer validations
  - “Audit fatigue”
- Validation and revalidation process will be quicker
- When applicable, companies will receive similar treatment from countries where MR has been achieved

## **MRA: Benefits (Government)**

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- Resources (time and money) would be better allocated.
  - Lower probability of on-site visits for MR Partner
- Validation and revalidation process will be quicker and smoother.
- Will lead to the establishment of true end-to-end global security.

### Background



- As a result of the terrorist attacks of **September 11<sup>th</sup>, 2001**, some customs procedures were modified to obtain a better control of the players who participate in the international supply chain. The United States, in particular, developed a certification program of the supply chain.
- In **2005**, the **World Customs Organization (WCO)** introduced **SAFE Framework** to develop the Authorized Economic Operator Program (AEO).
- **AEO is a certification granted by a customs authority to a company that proves to be committed to the security of its logistic chain through the implementation of security standards and systems.**
- **Mexico attached to SAFE Framework on 2005.**
- In **2012**, the **New Scheme of Certified Companies is introduced (NEEC)**, the **Mexico's AEO Program**, which includes the security standards recommended by the WCO.

## New Scheme of Certified Companies



- **It is a voluntary scheme, designed in coordination with the private sector**, looking forward to implement the best practices based on the international security standards.
- **Through NEEC, the Authority certifies that all procedures and controls, implemented by the players of the logistic chain, guarantee the security during the goods exchange.** In return, the companies are granted benefits to increase their levels of competitiveness and foster their operations.
- **Objectives:**
  - **To strengthen foreign trade**
  - **To optimize the international logistic chain**
  - **To promote competitiveness of the Mexican companies**
- **As up to day, NEEC certifies manufacturing companies, land carrier companies and customs brokers.** Soon, other players of the logistic chain are to be included, as well as industrial parks, sea terminals and courier companies.

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## Why NEEC?



NEEC aims to improve the security of the commercial chain ensuring, at the same time, the flow of certified goods through the borderline.

### A NEEC Company gets:

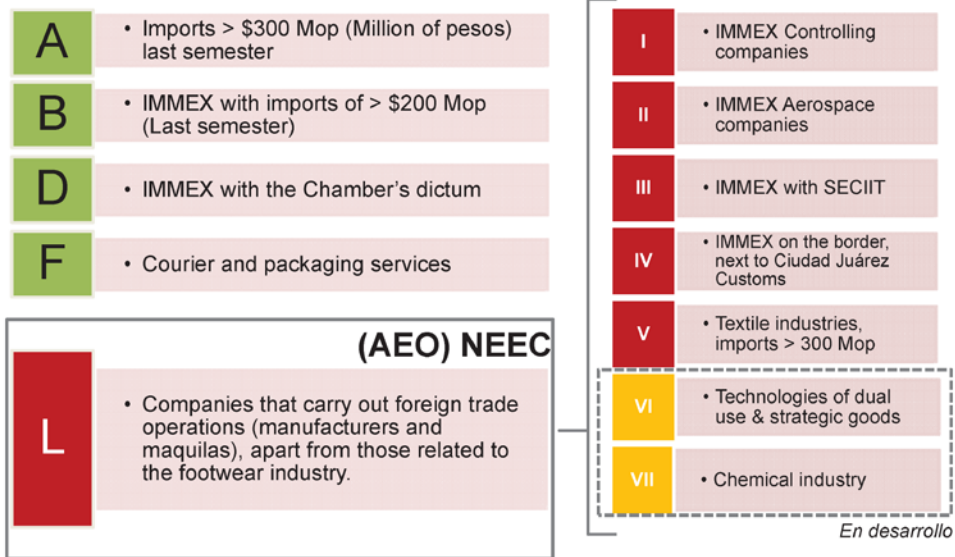
- **Operative security** improved in situ.
- **Better reputation** as a low risk company before the authority.
- A better understanding of the customs requirements and **speed up in its trade operations.**
- A better **communication between the employees and the authority**
- Same language with **world logistic players and Mutual Recognition benefits.**

## NEEC Benefits

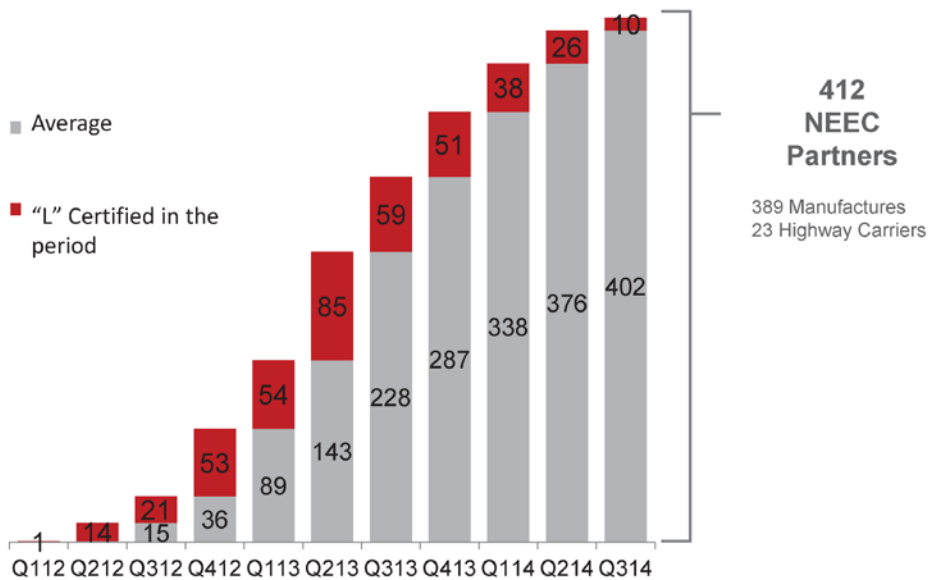

## NEEC in Figures



- **NEEC Companies carry out operations through 40 out of 49 customs throughout the country and execute more than 1.5 million importing and exporting crossings annually.**
- **For importation, NEEC Companies have exclusive lines in 6 out of the 10 main border customs which represent 73% of the total operations into the Mexican Republic.**
- **Since the beginning of the program, NEEC Companies have reduced their customs inspection time at a 27%.**
- **In 2013, NEEC Companies represent 41% of the total amount of the non-oil trade in the country, so, nowadays, "certified safe trade" represents around 283 billion dollars in importations and exportation.**

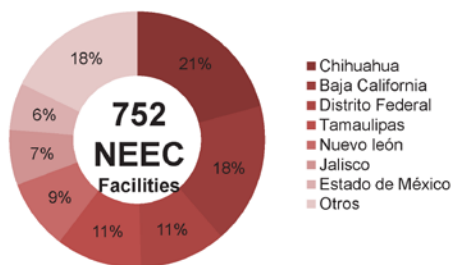
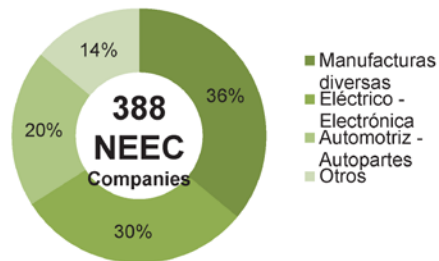

## Empresas NEEC



- At July 31th, 2014, **444 applications** were received (not including land carriers), of which:
  - **388 applications were authorized under NEEC "L" Section**
  - 34 applications are in process
  - 12 applications were withdrawn
  - 10 applications were solved with negative answer
- **All 444 applications cover 865 facilities**
- **All 388 NEEC certified companies have 752 facilities**
  - 275 facilities out of 752 are C-TPAT

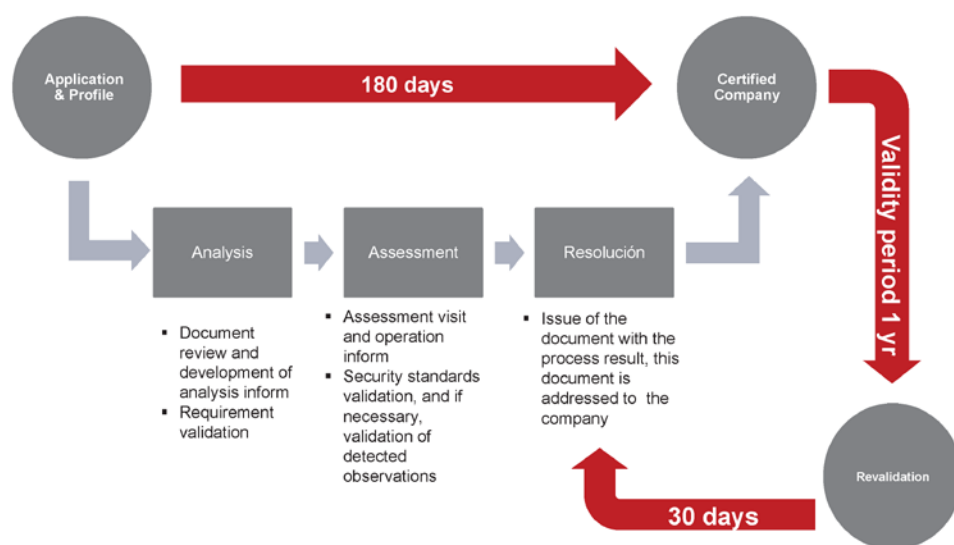


## Target Population

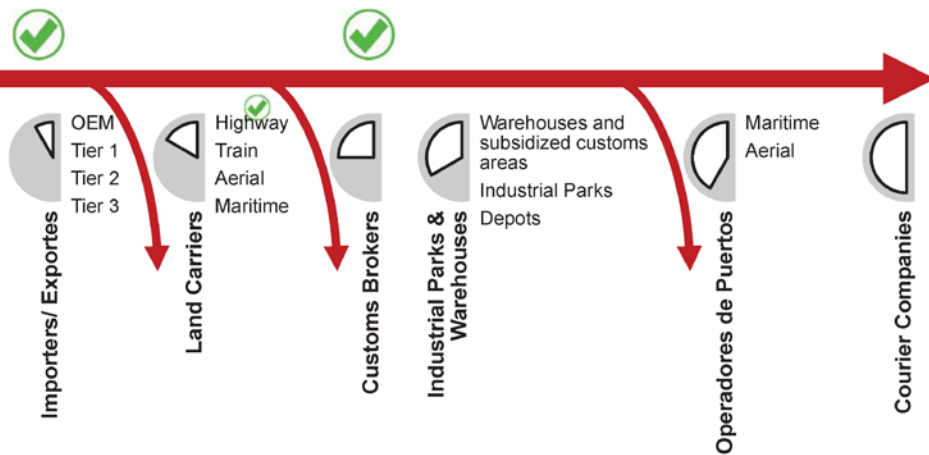


- **Companies, according to its features, that represent a potential universe to join NEEC:**
  - **950 companies, approximately, registered in the certified companies' census** which validity ends in one year.
  - Out of the, approximately, 87,000 companies registered in the importers' census, 40% presents a positive tax liabilities compliance, which represents 35,000 companies.
- **The NEEC subscription procedure has 3 stages: Analysis, Operative Assessment and Resolución.** This procedure is carried out in 140 labor days (6 months). Nowadays, we take an average of 120 days and we are still working to reduce that time.
- **We certified those companies that accomplish the document and physical requirements established in the corresponding Subscription Application and Security Profile.**

## Key Actions



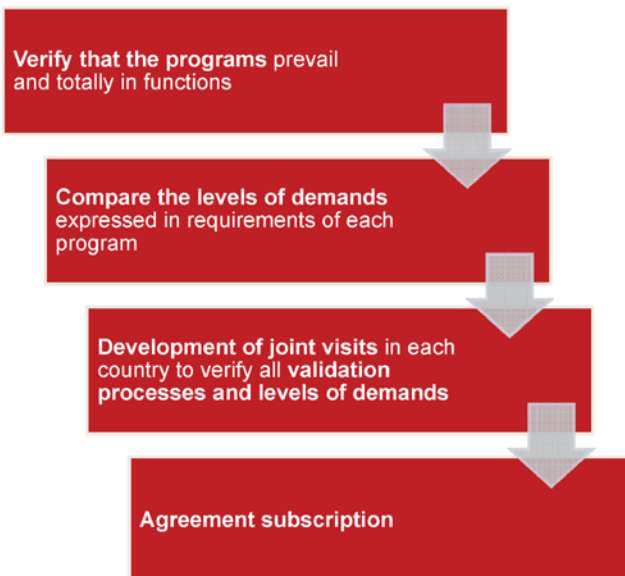
- **To make contact with foreign authorities** to exchange information related to certain issues;
- **To have permanent consultation with the private sector** about important topics in customs matter that need to be simplified and to facilitate the liabilities compliance;
- **To carry out residence visits, audits, inspections, surveillance acts, verifications** and other activities that are established in the tax and customs regulation to verify the liabilities compliance in customs matter derived from authorizations and concessions;
- **To coordinate security programs** and act as a link with other Institutions and authorities of foreign governments to adopt measures and the implementation of programs and projects on security that customs authorities should implement along with federal, state or local authorities.

## Mutual Recognition Agreement



- **Mexico has the strongest AEO program in Latin America**
- For this reason, several countries have approached Mexico in order to celebrate Mutual Recognition Agreement (MRA)
- **An MRA signing allows the recognition between two AEO programs and the compatibility of their requirements level.** Countries recognize the certified companies of its counterpart as reliable. It brings the development of new trade chains between nations and more benefits for the companies
- **On March 11th, 2014, an MRA between Mexico AEO (NEEC) and Korea AEO was signed. The first one in Mexico and in Latin America.**
- **We are in the last working stage to sign a similar Agreement with USA and its C-TPAT Program.** Once this MRA is signed, the benefits will be more visible as well as the customs operative facilitation for NEEC Certified Companies that participate in trade operations in this country

## Steps towards an MRA Signing



**For this six year presidential term, 6 major Agreements are considered, along with the current one signed with Korea:**

## Next Steps



- **SAT, through the Customs General Administration, will continue to strengthen NEEC** with a strategic vision that gathers the players of the supply chain's efforts. In order to do that, the following actions will take place:
- **To design a regulatory framework to continue the certification of other trade partners** within the supply chain
  - **To specialize and increase the number of NEEC personnel** to improve service. During the last year, the number of personnel has increased 20%
  - **To strengthen technical and personnel response capacities**
  - **Subscription of Mutual Recognition Agreement** with our major trade partners to expand markets
  - **Paperwork facilitation by electronic means**
  - **Development of a customs infrastructure** for safe trade
- **By the end of a six-year term, we estimate to have 500 importing – exporting certified companies, 250 land carriers, 200 customs brokers and 50 various trade partners**

- Multi-modal:

  - C-TPAT Partners will be given the opportunity to merge, expand, and duplicate existing accounts.



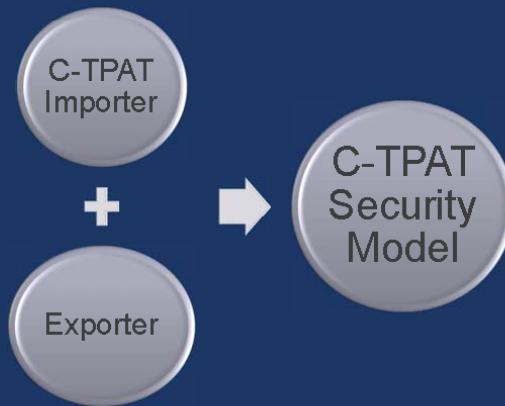
# Merge Security Model

- Definition: The ability to consolidate 2 security models (BEI, Company and Security Profile) into one multi-mode security profile.

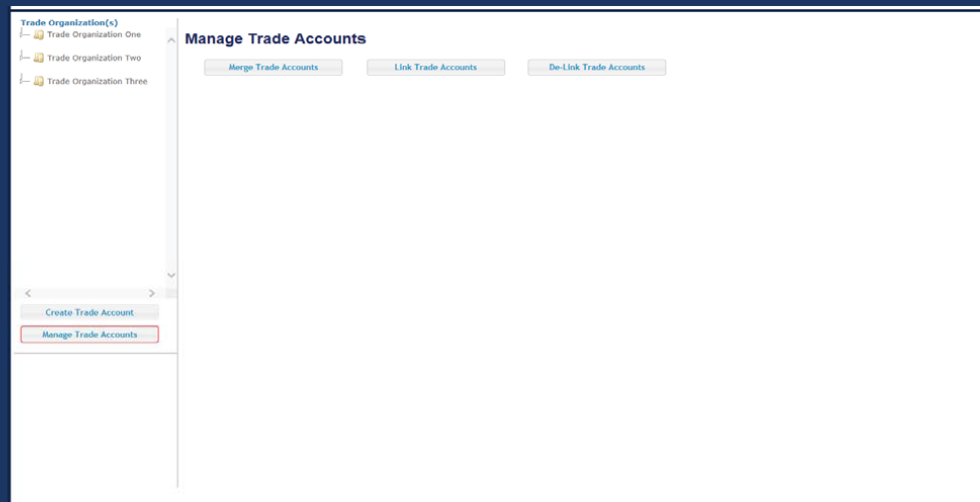

**BUSINESS PARTNER REQUIREMENTS - GENERAL** 1/4

Air carriers must have written and verifiable procedures for the screening of business partners, including carrier's agents and service providers. Air carriers must also have screening procedures for new customers, beyond financial requirements, to verify indicators of whether the customer appears to be a legitimate business and/or provide a security risk. Air carriers must also have procedures to review their contract's language that could affect the safety of the vessel or the cargo or otherwise raise significant security concerns, including unusual customer demands.

Air Carriers must maintain a comprehensive assessment of their security practices based upon the following C-TPAT general security criteria.
