


Mockernut Hickory

Carya tomentosa



- Each leaf with 5 or 7 leaflets.
- Nut meat is delicious eaten raw.
- Nut meat can be made into nut oil.
- Inner bark useful for making cords.

Wax myrtle


Myrica cerifera



- Crushed leaves are highly aromatic
- When rubbed on skin, can be used as insect repellent

Turkey Oak

Quercus laevis



- Leaves have 3 lobes which resemble a turkey foot
- Acorns are edible once they have been soaked in water to remove the tannic acid

Shiny Blueberry


Vaccinium myrsinites



- Grows as a low shrub
- Oblong, sharp-tipped leaves
- Edible berries

Muscadine Grape


Vitis



- Leaves have a toothed edge
 - Heart-shaped leaves
 - Edible fruit
- Vines used for basket making

Greenbrier


Smilax



- Rocket-shaped leaves
- Thorny vines
- Roots used to thicken soups
- Non-edible berries used for dye
- Vines used for basket making

Winged Sumac


Rhus copallina



- "Wings" on stem between leaflets
- Leaves turn bright red in autumn
- Small red berries were used to make "Indian lemonade"

Saw Palmetto

Serenoa repens



- Spiny stem used as a cutting tool.
- Fronds used for thatching mats.
- Fibers used for cordage and baskets.
- Berries highly nutritious but foul-tasting.
