摘要

心理治療研究學會(Society for Psychotherapy Research, 簡稱 SPR) 為一國際、多元學科的組織，致力於心理治療的研究，SPR 鼓勵心理治療研究的發展，同時著重與心理治療有關的研究基礎與應用。每年 SPR 的年會為來自不同國家的研究者們創造互動與對話的機會。本次工作坊與年會除了各國的研究者分享新的研究結果外，也鼓勵學生發展自己的研究，從研究的分享中交流各國心理治療的發展情況、新興的研究主題、研究方法的運用、研究的結束，以及實務工作者與研究者的交流、文化對於心理治療的影響。本人除參與會前工作坊、年會的論文研討外，也發表「**Taiwanese Client's Experiences with Counselors in High-Power Position**」之壁報論文，將台灣的心理治療經驗分享給其它國家的研究者。

關鍵字：心理治療、SPR

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一、 目的

藉由參與心理治療研究學會(Society for Psychotherapy Research, 簡稱 SPR)之年會與會前工作坊，認識各國學者目前在心理治療研究上的方向、了解學者在研究方法上的思考與運用、參與實務工作者與研究者的對話，也分享自己在台灣研究的結果與經驗，透過研究結果呈現台灣文化下心理治療歷程的特殊性。另外，也與不同的研究者互動與交流。

二、 行程

(一) 6月18日(六)

桃園機場出發至香港，再從香港機場前往安曼。

(二) 6月19日(日)

到達安曼，再從安曼至特拉維夫、於特拉維夫住宿。

(三) 6月20日(一)

在特拉維夫住宿。

(四) 6月21日(二)

從特拉維夫搭車至耶路撒冷

(五) 6月22日(三)

早上參加「Focusing on meaning in life in psychotherapy」工作坊，此工作坊由 Maryland 大學的 Clara Edith Hill 教授分享自己近期的研究，重新思考意義對人、對諮商者的影響，運用討論的方式說明目前研究的方向放在個人的生命意義對自己的影響，Hill 教授分享自己從文獻整理中找到的面向，也透過討論激發思考尚未被涵蓋的面向。

下午參與「Interpersonal psychotherapy(IPT)」的工作坊，由三位學者分別說明 IPT 學派的理論與實務，IPT 是透過協助個案解決人際問題而減緩症狀，是個有結構、短期的治療學派，在不同的諮商階段都有要完成的任務，而治療師的角色是很主同、具同理心且聚焦於人際問題。

(六) 6月23日(四)

早上參加的第一場會議是「Practice-oriented research: A semi-plenary session on the present and future of clinicians' and researchers' partnerships」由五位研究者分享自己的研究結果與經驗，並透過討論研究其研究方法的信效度，其中討論最多的是 SBS 系統，運用 SBS 系統讓大家能共享研究的資料，由資料的交流與共享中，激發更多的研究素材，得到更多的研究結果。

第二場會議是「What's the best way to triangulate for early career researchers?」，這場會議不同於其它研究分享與報告的會議，會議主持人、主講人與參與者共同討論自己的研究經驗，並討論在量化研究與質性研究上的思考與執行的困難。

第三場會議「Alliance ruptures and resolutions: Training and practice」中所發表的研究呈現出治療者在面對同盟關係受損時態度與介入上的影響與差異。第四場會議「Alliance ruptures and repair and their relation to patient process and outcome」中所分享的研究，呈現出治療同盟與治療結果的關係。

晚上進行壁報論文發表，我發表「Taiwanese Client's Experiences with Counselors in High-Power Position」，透過研究發展將台灣心理治療領域的經驗分享給不同國家的研究者，研究結果呈現華人文化中重關係與和諧的價值觀深深地影響諮商關係。也藉此機會與自日本、中國大陸與以色列當地的研究者交流，談及心理治療之文化研究的重要性與推動的困難。

(七) 6月24日(五)

早上的第一場會議是「Therapeutic change in attachment-based therapies」，研究者分享依附治療學派在實務上的成效，運用研究的方式說明個案經歷治療後的改變。第二場會議是「Different ways to assess and validate adult attachment」，由研究者分享自己如何測量成人的依附類型，不同測量方式的討論。

下午的第一場會議是「How to establish a research and training clinic for psychotherapy? Essentials, pitfalls, short-term and long-term goals」，本場會議邀請許多在世界各地進行治療師培訓與研究的學者，參與者也有許多是實務工作者、研究者與學生，本場會議有許多熱烈的討論，也分享各地訓練的方式、如何進行訓練成效的評估以及如何突破貫時性研究的困難。第二場會議是「Practice-Oriented Research: Therapist effects and training」中藉由研究的結果討論治療師的訓練對治療結果的影響、也討論受訓者接受訓練後的回饋。晚上，參與另一梯次的壁報論文發表，觀摩其它研究者的研究主題、研究方法與研究結論。

(八) 6月25日(六)

早上的第一場會議的主題是「Studies of therapist training and early development: First findings of the SPRISTAD study from Finland, Italy and India」，本場的研究是與 SPR 合作，運用 SPR 所發展出 SPRISTAD 的訓練架構培訓當地的治療師，再研究其訓練成效，研究呈現此模式能協助受訓者提高能力。第二場會議是「Supervision at the crossroads: Addressing challenges and dilemmas」此會議的研究者分享各地治療師尋求督導的情況、以及督導中處理反移情、問題解決與督導關係的議題。

下午第一場是「Couple & Family Therapy」研究者分別呈現自己翻譯問卷後信效度的研究、分析伴侶或家族治療中的現象、第二場是「On client

disclosures in psychotherapy: "Honesty is such a lonely word, everyone is so untrue"」，研究者分別從不同的角度討論個案在諮商中隱瞞的現象。

三、 心得與建議

出席此次研討會其中最大的感觸是不論學者在心理治療領域的資歷，都呈現出積極地透過此會議與他人分享和交流自己的研究興趣與經驗，而且也積極地透過討論為自己的研究展開新的思考，所以開放度很高，且少有因資歷而出現的階層感。另外，也看到許多非西方國家的學者積極地討論如何整合個地的研究經驗，以呈現心理治療中文化的議題，但文化的研究仍在少數，是個待努力研究的領域。就研究方法的部份，也從一些學者的分享中學習到質性研究方法上，如何將質性研究的價值突顯也成為未來重要的方向。

建議未來台灣有更多的研究者，將心理治療的台灣經驗帶到研究會上分享，更能促使國際上對於心理治療多元文化觀點的重視。

Taiwanese Client's Experiences with Counselors in High-Power Position

Introduction

The existence of power differential in a counseling relationship has been confirmed by studies (Dryden, 2009; Sexton & Whiston, 1994). To avoid abuse of power, which leads to inefficient counseling and potential harm to the client, it is necessary for the counselor to have a high level of awareness of power differential in the counseling room (Corey, Corey & Callanan, 2011; Totton, 2009; Zur, 2014). Nevertheless, only a few studies are conducted towards power relationships in counseling (Reandeu & Wamplod, 1991; Xue, 2010), and in which little is talked about how a client recognizes and faces such counselors. Since power differential is inevitable, the purpose of this study is directed towards improving counselors' awareness of power position in counseling by discussing the experiences of clients facing counselors in high-power position. This study attempts to find out how a client judges whether his/her counselor is in a high power position, and how a client deal with the high power of his/her counselor.

Method

An invitation letter is posted on Taiwan Counseling Net, wherein the topic, the interview protocol, and the welfare of the research participants are described. Six participants (five females, one male, Mage= 29.5 years, age range: 24-35 years) are interviewed. Five of them are interviewed twice and the other one once. Each interview lasts 50-90 minutes. Each participant has the experience of counseling ranging from eight to 92 sessions. The interviews are recorded with the participants' consents and then transcribed. Thematic analysis is employed for analyzing data.

Result

The result shows that a client recognizes counselors in high-power positions by looking for two signs. The first one is the gap between the client's expectations and the counselor's plan. The gap may occur in the pace of counseling, level of disclosure, selection of topics, and the length of sessions. The second one is the counselor's approaches that prevent the client from expressing and insisting on his/her needs. The approaches include aggressive confrontation, redirection of topic, answering questions with questions, ignoring client's questions and feelings, obstinateness, exaggerating the gravity and severity of client's problem, and accusatory analysis, suggestions and persuasions.

The result also indicates that clients tend to compromise when facing counselors in high-power positions. The reasons behind the compromise of a client can be categorized into personal and cultural ones.

- Personal reasons are:
 1. Seeing compromise as a means of breakthrough and change.
 2. To prevent disagreement which renders sessions futile.
- Cultural reasons include:
 1. Obedience to authority, believing in that following an expert's orders would solve his/her problem.
 2. Seeing questioning an expert as an improper behavior.
 3. Regarding a harmonious relationship with the counselor as more important than his/her own needs.


Conclusion

- Clients tend to sense the power differential via facial expression, attitude, language, and professional knowledge of their counselors.
- Clients tend to sense the power differential through their negative emotions such as fear, worry, hurt, angry and disappointment towards their counselors, instead of directly recognize it.
- Expectations to the counseling and trust to the counselor are two factors that can influence clients on their judge of counselors' power positions.
- Clients tend to compromise when facing counselors in high-power positions due to personal and cultural reasons.

Abstract

This study is directed towards improving counselors' awareness of power position in counseling by exploring the experiences of clients facing counselors in high-power position with hermeneutic phenomenological methodology. Six participants are interviewed. Thematic analysis is employed for analyzing data. The findings indicate: (a) clients tend to sense the power differential via facial expression, attitude, language, and professional knowledge of their counselors; (b) clients tend to sense the power differential through their negative emotions such as fear, worry, hurt, angry and disappointment towards their counselors, instead of directly recognize it; (c) expectations to the counseling and trust to the counselor are two factors that can influence clients on their judge of counselors' power positions; (d) clients tend to compromise when facing counselors in high-power positions due to personal and cultural reasons.
