摘要

2016年09月21日至09月23日赴澳門参加國際商管教育認證聯盟亞太地區年度會議(AACSB Asia Pacific Annual Conference),本研討會之議程為9月21日至9月23日共為期三天,為了提升本校國立中正大學管理學院之教育品質和國際競爭力,本院除接受來自於教育部週期性大學評鑑和卓越教學的補助外,本院亦積極參與國際商管學院促進協會(AACSB International)的認證,期許能透過此一國際認可的商管教育認證提升本校國立中正大學管理學院之教育品質和國際競爭力。目前全球通過 AACSB 認證的學術機構已將近千個,而目前臺灣地區已有18所商管學院已通過 AACSB 認證,本學院也經歷了數年的努力,已在2016年4月獲得 AACSB 的認證。

此次會議是國際商管學院促進協會所主辦的年度重要會議,本出國報告含參加該研討會之目的、參加過程、心得感想、以及相關建議事項。

目的

國際商管教育認證聯盟年會(AACSB Asia Pacific Annual Conference)是國際商管教育認證聯盟(AACSB)的主要年度會議,AACSB 係針對世界各管理學學院認證的非政府組織,核心任務是推動全球管理教育品質的認證,廣為全球重視與推崇,本次 2016 的亞太地區年度會議在澳門舉行,除透過小組討論互相學習激盪出不同的解決困難之道,並藉由各演講及分享了解最新的制度及工具,藉由參與此研討會以掌握最新資訊,並且與國際學者進行交流,以利取得相關的資訊。

過程

2016年9月前往澳門,參加由國際商管教育認證聯盟(AACSB)主辦之亞太地區年度會議(Asia Pacific Annual Conference)。而除了參與研討會外,也與來自於臺灣、美國、中國大陸等的世界各大學教師交換名片,並交流彼此進行 AACSB 認證的經驗。

於 9/21 註冊過後,下午參加歡迎酒會(Welcome Reception),藉著這個機會與同來自亞太區的學術機構代表,互相學習在推動 AACSB 認證時所會遭遇之困難與挑戰,以及在商業研究和教育的交流,並且體驗當地文化也與來自於臺灣、美國、中國大陸等的世界各大學教師交換名片彼此交流。

9/22,首先參與主要會議,塑造亞洲消費者的五力:對商學院的未來影響
(PLENARY I: 5 Forces Shaping Asian Consumers: Impact on the Future of Business Schools),討論在亞洲變革的主要驅動因素,協調全球化底下保留當地文化,確定五力塑造亞洲消費者的生活、對商業教育的影響並對消費者的需求作出反應,願望和未來並且將目標投向商學院的未來;休息及交流時間之後參與了持續性發展和企業社會責任(Sustainability and Corporate Social Responsibility),討論在組織以積極的社會變革,改善人民生活質量並創造價值,特別是學生和大學分享可持續發展和社會責任的實踐,期許可以了解大學和外部組織之間的聯繫、持續發展,制定一個更好的社會;下午參加了大數據和數據分析課程(Addressing Big Data and Data Analytics in Curriculum),此會議專注於討論大數據挑戰和機會,如何充分利用數據的力量,以及為什麼被列入數據分析課程;經過短暫休息後再次參與主要會議,開發勞動力人才的現況 (PLENARY II: Developing Talent for Today's Workforce),在這個場次中聽到來自飯店及旅遊業,從企業的角度來看滿足當今的勞動力和未來的技能與能力,討論商業教育和企業界每個人扮演的角色之間的聯繫,以及在培養未來商業

領袖所需要發展的。

9/23,首先參加當日的會議認證問與答(Bonus Session: Accreditation Q&A),讓所有想參與認證的學校有一個很好的機會,提出問題與建議;接著參與大會主要會議,經濟成長和整合在亞洲商業教育的影響 (PLENARY III: Economic Growth and Integration in Asia With Implications for Business Education) 討論招聘合格的教師時最佳做法來克服挑戰,並認識到商學院在全球勞動力市場的競爭,會議最初將存在一般和特殊背景下,面臨招募學術團隊的挑戰。會議還旨在確保學術人才與一些有最佳實踐經驗與會者交流,還有機會了解商學院在招聘時可以考慮全球人才市場擴大其影響力和吸引力,加強在招聘的投資報酬率,回報未來的發展。

心得

此次能夠參與亞太地區年度會議(Asia Pacific Annual Conference),並與來自世界各地的國際學者互動,與來自不同學校商學學院院長、副院長與其他教師之間的交流是難能可貴的經驗,並且經由參與不同主題的研討會,了解最新的制度與工具,學習通過認證之學校經驗,再藉著茶敘或午晚宴的時機,把握機會將目前中正大學管理學院進行商管認證時所遇到的各種問題與現場先進做討論,收穫十分豐富。感謝科技部對於國內學者參與際研討會所給予的支持與補助,才能讓人有機會前往澳門參與此年度盛會,與來自全球各地的學者齊聚一堂,進行經驗的交流與分享。





Barry Burgan

Barry Burgan is associate dean of accreditation and international at Bond University. He recently joined Bond after an extended career at the University of Adelaide, the last eight years as dean of the business school, and a short time at Torrers University Australia. He has had a varied career path in the public sector and in management consulting. Burgan was dean at Adelaide over a period of substantial change, including the merger of the School of Commerce and the Graduate School of Management, a major building move to a significantly renovated building, and procuring AACSB Accreditation. He was on the Initial Accreditation Committee of AACSB for three years, has undertaken a number of review visits, and has mentored schools in their AACSB journey. Burgan researches in the area of infrastructure valuation and financing, with a particular interest in social infrastructure, and has a significant number of publications and research grants in this area. He teaches in the areas of financial management, quantitative methods, and real estate finance and investment.

Atish Chattopadhyay

Atish Chattopadhyay is presently director IMT, Ghaziabad. He held leadership positions in two leading institutions of India as dean at MICA in Ahmedahad and as deputy director at SPJIMR in Mumbai. At MICA, Chattopadhyay successfully restructured the admission process, which achieved a growth of around 50 percent in its applicant pool. He also spearheaded the formation of an advisory board for the digital marketing specialization in which leading industry experts formulated a contemporary curriculum—the first of its kind in India. At SPJIMR, Chattopadhyay successfully led the flagship two-year PGOM program and increased enrollment, maintained 100 percent placements, expanded international student exchange, restructured curriculum, enhanced alumni engagement, and submitted the program—ranked among the top 5 MBA programs in India—for accreditation by AACSB. The Global Fast Track was launched during his tenure, in which all participants undertook advanced specialization courses and projects through partnering with top U.S. business schools. Chattopadhyay believes in internationalization of Indian institutions and has presented across various international forums of AACSB and GMAC® and dreams of creating a global Indian is-school.

Shyh-Jer Chen

Shyh-jer Chen is a distinguished professor of the Institute of Human Resource Management and dean of the College of Management at National Sun Yat-sen University (NSYSU), Taiwan. He joined College of Management at NSYSU in 1995 and has been a faculty member there since then. He was a Fullbright visiting scholar at the University of Illinois from 2003–04 and achieved Outstanding Research Award from the National Science Council, Taiwan. Chen's research interests are in employee relations, human resource exonomics. He has published articles in a variety of journals, including Industrial and Labor Relations Review, the Journal of International Business Studies, Industrial Relations,

Human Resource Management, Management and Organization Review, the International Journal of Human Resource Management, the Asia Pacific Journal of Management, and Family Business Review. He received his PhD in industrial and labor relations from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign in 1995.

Song Chen

Song Chen has been the deputy dean for international accreditation and human resources management since 2009 and is a full professor of technology economics and management at the School of Economics and Management at Tongil University. He fed a Sino-French joint MBA program, SIMBA (Shanghai International MBA), as executive dean from 2004 to 2013, and the program was ranked among the top 50 in the Financial Times EMBA ranking for years. Chen is, among others, a member of the International Advisory Board of SKEMA Business School in France, a regional editor of the Journal of Technology Management in China, and an editorial member of the Asian Journal of Technology Innovation. He provided consulting services for the Science and Technology Committee of Shanghai Municipality, Hyundai Motors (China), LG Chem (China), Shanghai Volkswagen, and CMA-CGM on strategy, innovation, and technology policy in China. He was an Audi visiting professor at Ingolstadt School of Management in Germany in July 2013 and a visiting professor at LMU Germany in February 2010. He holds a PhD in innovation management from the School of Economics and Management at Tsinghua University, Bejling.

Leonard K. Cheng

Leonard K. Cheng is president and chair professor of economics of Lingnan University, Hong Kong's liberal arts university. Before taking up Lingnan's presidency in September 2013, Cheng served as acting dean and dean of the HKUST Business School since July 2007.

Lorelle Frazer

Lorelle Frazer is director of online and blended learning at the Griffith Business School and director of the Asia-Pacific Centre for Franchising Excellence at Griffith University. Prior to that, she was the dean of learning and teaching at the Griffith Business School. The Griffith Business School received AACSB Accreditation in February 2009 and its assurance of learning process was recognized as a best practice by the review panel. In 2010, Frazer was appointed as a global facilitator for AACSB international to co-facilitate assurance of learning seminars in Australia.

Xitona Guo

She is also an associate professor of management and has held leadership roles including HOD (acting) and deputy HOD of the Department of Management at AUT. Her main areas of research are academic careers, career development, gender issues in management, media representations and discourses of work, and qualitative and critical approaches to research. Harris 'service roles include being a member of the New Zealand Women in Leadership (NZWiL) Steering Group, the AUT Ignite Women in Leadership Programme Development Group, and various diversity committees. She also has experience in executive education, delivering leadership development programs.

Catherine Hodgson

Catherine Hodgson is the manager of AoUAACSB and blended learning within the Griffith Business School (GBS) at Griffith University. Prior to moving into the area of AACSB assurance of learning, she taught and lectured, both students and faculty, for over 20 years in the areas of ICT, elearning, and blended learning. She also worked on various government initiatives introducing e-learning across the U.K. in the early 1990s. Hodgson now manages the AoUAACSB strategy and process across the GBS and continues to refine and further develop ALEC, the web-based tool used to facilitate these efforts.


