Safety Leadership



Safety Leadership principles to develop internal capacity that proactively manage safety; to collectively achieve and celebrate safety goals.



Just Culture/Trust



Recognize safety investigations as a means to identify systemic issues, of which human error is a symptom and not a cause, and does not assign blame to errors.



Openness



Encourage free-reporting as a tool to identify safety issues that might not be captured through other data-capturing tools

Learning



Creating actionable intelligence from data as a key driver of continuous improvement
